CES Parliamentary Monitor – June 2021

This month the easing of lockdown restricts was delayed by <u>four weeks</u> in England. <u>In Wales</u>, First Minister Mark Drakeford confirmed that a further easing of lockdown restrictions will be delayed by at least four weeks amidst an increase in cases of the Delta variant.

In both England and Wales there have been concerns around the different coronavirus variants and the way in which they may affect the easing of restrictions. Public Health Wales <u>confirmed</u> that the Delta variant, first identified in India, is now the most commons strain of new Covid-19 cases in Wales, with case numbers involving the variant rising more than 70 percent in four days since 10 June. The First Minister for Wales, <u>Mark Drakeford</u>, has accused the Prime Minister of "aggressively" ignoring Wales. UK Ministers have cautioned that focusing on constitutional affairs was an "irresponsible" distraction from the pandemic.

In England, school isolation rules for Covid could end in Autumn, the <u>BBC</u> has reported. At present, if one student tests positive with Covid all peers in their bubble must isolate too. A pilot scheme is assessing the efficacy of replacing this system with daily on-site testing for pupils. It has also been reported that the school day will be <u>extended</u> by half an hour under a £15bn Covid rescue plan to help Britain's children to catch up after months of disrupted education. Tutoring sessions for pupils in England are also being <u>promised</u> in school catch-up plans that will cost £1.4bn over three years. At the G7 Summit in Cornwall, the Prime Minister called on <u>G7</u> to help educate every child in the world.

7 June 2021 – 7894 – Sarah Olney (Richmond Park)

To ask the Secretary of State for Education, whether his Department plans to take steps in response to the recommendations of the National Secular Society's report entitled Religiosity inspections: the case against faith-based reviews of state schools, including repeal of section 48 of the Education Act 2005.

Answered by Nik Gibb

Section 48 of the Education Act 2005 places a duty on the governing body of maintained schools that are designated as having a religious character, to arrange for the inspection of any denominational education and collective worship. This requirement applies to maintained faith schools and academies (via the funding agreement). In arranging the inspection, the school must consult with the appropriate religious body, specified in regulations. This approach brings a consistency of approach and oversight to the inspections.

The Government greatly values the contribution that faith schools make to the education sector by providing high quality school places and choice for parents. Section 48 inspections provide assurance in relation to the religious education and collective worship provided in these schools. There are no plans to change the current arrangements for the inspection of designated faith schools.

10 June 2021 – 7726 – Gareth Thomas (Harrow West)

To ask the Chancellor of the Exchequer, if he will exempt Catholic sixth form colleges from paying VAT; and if he will make a statement.

Answered by Jesse Norman (Hereford and South Herefordshire)

Under the current VAT rules, the supply of education by an eligible body, including sixth form colleges, without a charge is outside the scope of VAT. Where a charge is applied, it is exempt from VAT. In either case, this means that no VAT is charged on these services. The Government has no plans to review these provisions.

11 June 2021 – 8733 – Luke Pollard (Plymouth, Sutton and Devonport)

To ask the Secretary of State for Education, whether schools are required to include the teaching of RE in the education recovery plans of pupils that have lost learning during the covid-19 outbreak; and if he will make a statement.

Answered by Nick Gibb

Religious education (RE) is not an optional subject for state funded schools. They must teach RE to all pupils throughout all Key Stages up to age 18. Teaching a broad and balanced curriculum is important to the academic, social, and personal development of young people. These requirements have not changed because of the COVID-19 outbreak.

The Department is working with a broad range of stakeholders to develop a range of short, medium, and long term options to ensure all young people recover their education over the term of this Government.

14 June 2021 – 13147 – Peter Kyle (Hove)

To ask the Secretary of State for Education, how many covid-19 lateral flow tests have been (a) distributed to schools for pupil use and (b) formally completed by pupils since March 2021.

Answered by Nick Gibb

The number of COVID-19 lateral flow tests that have been distributed to schools and further education colleges since 1 March 2021 is 192,931,671, of which 135,452,570 are for pupils. This includes 126,705,245 COVID-19 lateral flow self-test kits for testing at home.

The number of lateral flow tests that have been completed by pupils in secondary schools, excluding colleges, between 4 March and 2 June is 21.9 million.

The number of lateral flow tests that have been completed in total since 4 March and up to 2 June for all education settings, including higher education, is 47.7 million. This includes testing of pupils, staff, school household bubble testing, and school support bubble testing. 14 June 2021 – 10631 – Luke Pollard (Plymouth, Sutton and Devonport)

To ask the Secretary of State for Education, whether his Department has received representations on the adequacy of funding for Standing Advisory Councils on Religious Education; and if he will make a statement.

Answered by Nick Gibb

The Department has received a copy of a report produced by the National Association of Standing Advisory Councils on Religious Education (NASACRE). The report presents a summary of responses received from local authorities to Freedom of Information requests relating to funding of Standing Advisory Councils on Religious Education (SACRES).

Local authorities are allocated funding through the central school services block (CSSB) for a range of duties that they must meet for all pupils in maintained schools and academies, such as establishing and

maintaining a SACRE. In financial year 2021/22, the total funding for ongoing responsibilities in the CSSB is £257 million, a 3.8% increase compared to 2020/21, to keep up with inflation and pupil numbers.

The Department does not specify what proportion of this money should be attributed to different services or duties. It is up to each local authority to decide this for itself. We expect that a SACRE should be sufficiently resourced to meet its statutory duties. If a SACRE is unable to do this, it should first raise a complaint locally about the issue. If it has done this unsuccessfully, the issue can be escalated to the Department's School Complaints Unit.

21 June 2021 – 16780 – Dr Julian Lewis (New Forest East)

To ask the Secretary of State for Education, what assessment he has made of whether the recent teaching materials issued to primary schools by the National Association of Teachers of Religious Education is in breach of the prohibition on political propaganda in the classroom; and if he will make a statement.

Answered by Nick Gibb

The law is clear that schools must remain politically impartial. Head teachers and staff have a responsibility to ensure that they act appropriately, particularly in the political views they express. When political issues are discussed, schools must offer pupils a balanced presentation of opposing views and should not present materials in a politically biased or one sided way.

Schools should not teach contested theory or opinions as fact and must ensure they uphold their duties with regard to political impartiality. Schools should be mindful of the need to offer a balanced presentation of opposing views as well as the age appropriateness of teaching, given that balanced treatment of such issues may not be possible with younger pupils.

Political impartiality in our education system is an important principle to uphold. The Department is developing further guidance to support schools to understand and meet their duties in this area.

Lords

16 June 2021 – HL729 – Baroness Eaton

To ask Her Majesty's Government what progress has been made on the Department for Education's work to tackle child sexual abuse following the publication of the Government's Tackling Child Sexual Abuse Strategy.

Answered by Baroness Berridge

The department is working closely with the Home Office and other government departments on delivering the Tackling Child Sexual Abuse Strategy. Work is well underway with the rollout of statutory Relationships, Sex and Health Education (RSHE) in schools, the appointment of national facilitators to support safeguarding partners to embed effective local practice and the launch of the online resource Together We Can Stop Sexual Abuse to build public awareness and signpost access to support.

On 10 June, the department went further in its commitment to tackling child sexual abuse, announcing a range of measures in response to Ofsted's recommendations following their review of sexual abuse in schools. Measures include better supporting teachers and school leaders to recognise sexual harassment and abuse and teach confidently about issues of consent, online pornography and healthy relationships, encouraging schools to dedicate inset day time to help train staff on how to deal with sexual abuse and harassment among pupils and how to deliver the government's new RSHE curriculum, strengthening safeguarding guidance to boost teacher confidence in identifying and responding to these issues and providing supervision to dedicated members of school and college staff in up to 10 more local authorities, whose role it is to identify safeguarding concerns among pupils.
